

CHILD / WOMEN WELFARE FOUNDATION ANNUAL REPORT 2021

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Executive Summary

The ongoing crisis / conflict has been responsible for thousands of lives lost, livelihoods disrupted and communities in Anglophone Regions of Cameroon in disarray. These unpleasant events have led to the establishment of this Community Based Organization known as Child / Women Welfare Foundation (CWWF).

After some delay, this organization was green - lighted by the Government Authority early in September 2021 to commence its operation. With limited resources, generated by members and a few patrons, it was able to provide some relief to children and women in situations of dire need. Some of its members volunteered with International Agencies that were addressing critical needs among women in Cameroon.

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Background

Since October 2016, Cameroon has experienced an ongoing crisis / conflict which has had severe impact on the Anglophone Region. Many lives and livelihoods have been lost, homes destroyed and over 2 000 000 persons have been internally displaced. This triggered a socio-economic crisis which was compounded by COVID 19 pandemic and other diseases eg. malaria.

How can locals within the affected Region work to bring about peace and alleviate the suffering of the Anglophone people? In seeking answer to this question, the idea for the establishment of a Community Based Organization (CBO) in the Meme Division of the South West Region of Cameroon was conceived during the last quarter of 2020. Even as the rules were being formulated persons who became members started volunteering their services with United Nations Population Funds (UNFPA) and United Nations International Children's Emergency Funds (UNICEF).

An application to be registered as a CBO was made in April last year after a constitution was put together by its membership. The process to registration took five months. On 2nd September 2021 Child / Women Welfare Foundation became a registered Non – Profit Organization: Registration No: G.39/SAAJP/D14/5/1257. Almost immediately after receiving the certificate of registration, members began pooling their resources together to respond to situations of dire need.

Statement from CWWF President

As I reflect on the work carried out by Child / Women Welfare Foundation (CWWF) in 2021, my fellow members, patrons and friends I am overcome as much by the gravity of the problems we have set out to address. We know all about the crisis / conflict that it has impacted lives and livelihoods. We were aware of casualties and persons being displaced, but the magnitude of the situation was not known until CWWF hit the ground and started reaching out as its resources would allow. My brothers and sisters the suffering is great and the needs are urgent.

We are a young and small organization but all of us who are involved have demonstrated that each one of us possess a humanitarian's heart. I salute each one of you for giving of your time and resources to the cause of helping our brothers and sisters in their dire need. As a local entity made up of local people who also have been negatively impacted by this ongoing conflict, we are best positioned to respond to situations unfolding in communities. We cannot address the myriad of needs as they present themselves. However, as an organization we need to restructure; be pro-active by networking with other entities and be aggressive in fundraising efforts to be able to deliver in areas of critical needs among our children and women as we toil to help restore our communities.

I count it a great privilege to be at the helm of this young and dynamic organization. My gratitude to all for the cooperation and other forms of support given that allowed us to

touch lives in meaningful ways. I pray and trust Almighty God that in 2022 we all will come with renewed strength and purpose to serve the underprivileged, less fortunate and those suffering in our communities here in Anglophone Cameroon.

ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS - 2021

The following are highlights of Child / Women Welfare Foundation (CWWF) work in response to critical needs among children and women in communities within Meme Division of the Anglophone South West Region of Cameroon. These activities were undertaken between September 3rd and December 31st.

1.1 Menstrual Hygiene Management:

The ongoing conflict in the Anglophone Regions of Cameroon have led to over 2 000 000 internally displaced persons. Houses have been burnt and families have fled in large numbers to forested areas to escape with their lives. Thers have taken refuge at homes of relatives, friends and kind persons who willingly open their homes. This emergency situation has led to serious menstrual hygiene management challenges among women and adolescent girls. They have been signicantly challenged in managing their menstruation safely, comfortably and with dignity.

CWWF used a part of its resources to purchase an amount of reusable sanitary pads and also received a donation of a small amount from an agency. These were distributed to IDPs - women and adolescent girls.

1.2. Health Education:

Volunteer members of CWWF conducted a few Health Education and Sensitization Activities - HIV / AIDS "Know Your Status." The Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) temporarily living in Cameroon South West Region communities and youths were targeted.

CWWF volunteers mobilized adults and children from Cameroon South West Region communities for health education / sensitization on malaria and its prevention. On that day children were inspected for skin infection and oral hygiene.

Like all countries globally, the COVID 19 pandemic was a challenge for Cameroon and its people. Lives were lost, persons were overwhelmed with fear and adjustments were made to lifestyles in keeping with proposed safety measures. CWWF volunteers worked on the National Vaccination Programme for COVID 19. Women from communities in the South West Region of Cameroon were sensitized about COVID 19 and the importance of vaccination.

This ongoing crisis / conflict has severely impacted children in the Anglophone Regions of Cameroon. Whatever political merits and demerits can be identified for this conflict such does not matter to a group called **CHILDREN**. They are victims to the core. This crisis have robbed many chlidren of their mothers, their fathers, and in many cases both parents. Children themselves have been killed while others have been maimed; loss of arm, loss of leg. Many schools have not been operating; forced to close owing to the crisis. Girls have been raped and many taken away as sex slaves. This helpless category, children, CWWF would not overlook in its work.

1.5. Medical Aid Provision:

Since the start of the conflict in October 2016, there has been emerging and reemerging infections. CWWF used from its limited resources to take two abandoned children to hospital for urgent medical care. While some aspect of medical care is free some have to be paid for.

As part of its Capacity Building process, Child / Women Welfare Foundation (CWWF) members are encouraged do free online training programmes aimed at equipping each individual with knowledge and skills. The hope is that the acquired organizational and technical knowledge will be applied to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the organization so it can work towards achieving its purpose and provide quality services.
