ABOUT EMPOWERMENT FOR THE POOR-UGANDA

Empowerment for the Poor-Uganda (EFPU) is a Non-Governmental Organization dully registered by Uganda NGO Registration Bureau with Registration Number: INDR110972420NB, and Operation Permit Number: INDP105542420NB that is committed to a rights based approach to community development where we work to free communities of poverty, violence and human rights abuse. Our work in addition to responding to immediate needs of vulnerable communities, we majorly focus on sustainable long term changes. Our programme interventions include education, child protection and child safeguarding, economic empowerment and self reliance enhancement among the youth and women through agricultural productivity and smart conservation and environmental friendly projects We also intergrate gender based violence prevention ,HIV & AIDS prevention and sexual and reproductive health pragraming among others. EFPU's education programming strives to provide quality formal and non-formal education opportunities that meet the needs of girls and boys in vulnerable and crisis environments. Our work has a particular focus on adolescent girls who are among the worst affected by dangerous environments and violence. Currently We work in Central Uganda in the districts of Kampala, Wakiso, Mityana, Kiboga and Masaka especially in areas with high rates of poverty, HIV infection, domestic gender violence and and with high school drop out by increasing access of children especially the girl child to education and health opportunities, building the capacities of their families to overcome their socio economic barriers through enhancing their business and entrepreneurship abilities empowering out of school youth to become self-reliant through mentorship, work readiness /soft skills, skilling ,accelerated education While we advance the rights of all children and young people and women in all their diversity, we focus particularly on girls and young women and the specific vulnerabilities they face.

Since its inception in 2014, EFPU discovered that poverty is the common denominator to all other development challenges like HIV infection, gender-based violence, education drop out among others. We believe that poverty incapacitates the ability of the poor people to dream, disconnects them from opportunities and in the end make them live disgraceful and miserable lives. That is why EFPU builds the capacity of impoverished women and youth to overcome their socio-economic barriers through enhancing their business and entrepreneurship abilities, creating for them opportunities in agriculture productivity and value addition as well as increasing their access to education and health services.

Our work supports specifically women and youth in rural areas with trainings in business and entrepreneurial skills, food security and agri-business ,value addition, branding, packaging and market research. Beneficiaries are supported with micro-loans to start business ventures; we also increase education opportunities to orphans and vulnerable children to ensure their access, retention and completeness to education plus promoting health programs in the community.

OVERARCHING STRATEGIC OBJECTIVE OF THIS STRATEGIC PLAN

EFPU drives change with youth and women especially adolescents to advance their human rights and gender equality in all contexts. Our priorities are 1. Adolescent vulnerable girls and boys in schools and young women dropped out of school to ensure that their needs, rights, dignity and self-respect are upheld. We therefore concentrate more on empowering the children in schools with skills of the 21 century and business/employability skills to enable them become business leaders at an early age , empowering poor women and youth to start income generating ventures to help them come out of poverty. EFPU also supports increased access, retention and completeness to education among orphans and vulnerable children in government aided schools in line with implementation and attainment of Vision 2040 for Uganda as well as supplementing on both the local and central government's efforts of skilling the youth, promote agricultural productivity and value addition

The strategic Plan will also strive to become more inclusive and responsive to the voices of girls, people with disabilities, people living HIV positive lives and ensure meaningful participation of young people in the organization's programs. As a cross-cutting priority, we will develop strong partnerships and collaborate with many actors across borders and sectors. Since partnerships are critical for successful advocacy to deliver results for youth and women in amplifying their voices understanding that together our voices are stronger.

This Strategic Plan therefore will be implemented for a period of 60 months starting from May 2019 to June 2024 and it is budgeted to cost **US\$ 450,982** which is equivalent to Ug shs **1,623,535,200.** We call upon all partners to support us in implementing this Strategic Plan

1.1 Vision, Goal and Specific Objectives (SO)

Vision:

"To create an empowered community where women and youth live healthier, peaceful and self reliant lives".

Mission:

To promote socio-economic, health and education programs that build the capacity of impoverished youth and women to come out of poverty through skills equipping and connection to market opportunities

Goal:

To improve the capacity of individuals, families and communities living in poor conditions to enable them come out of poverty and maximize their potential.

3. To increase access, retention and completeness to education among vulnerable children

Intermediate outcome 1100: Improved provision of inclusive, safe, gender-responsive and equitable quality basic education for vulnerable children and adolescents, especially girls

Immediate outcome 1110: Improved availability of inclusive, protective, genderresponsive and equitable quality formal primary and secondary education for vulnerable children and adolescents

- Primary and secondary school teachers and education managerstrained in inclusive, protective, gender-responsive, sensitive teaching-learning practices
- Construction, refurbishment& furnishing of gender-responsive and inclusive classrooms and other facilities (libraries, WASH facilities) in selected primary and secondary schools
- Teaching-learning materials provided to primary and secondary schools, and hygiene kits for adolescent boys and dignity kits for adolescent girls.
- Financial support provided for incentive payments to teachers in selected schools with high teacher shortages

- Back-to-learning enrolment campaigns organized targeting parents/caregivers and community members, with a focus on enrolment of out of school children and adolescents, especially girls, including those with disabilities
- Community awareness and back-to-learning campaigns targeting parents/caregivers/community members of both out-of-school and in-school children in gender response
